Prospective Economics (not Business Economics) majors are advised to complete a second semester of Calculus, in addition to the courses required for transfer admission.</p> <p>4.2 <b>UCI:</b> Add two courses from: Anthropology 100, 101, 103, 104; English 104; Geography 100, 101, 102; Psychology 100; Sociology 100.</p> <p>4.3 <b>UCI:</b> Add Computer Science (112 and 121) or choose another course after transfer.
