COURSE TITLE: First Aid Refresher (CJA 039B)

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Recognize the legal issues involved in providing care to an ill or injured patient
- Plan an appropriate response to treat an ill or injured patient
- Use safe practices to avoid exposure to communicable illnesses

COURSE CONTENT:

Course overview, legal issues, Good Samaritan law, right to refuse treatment, DNR

Emergency child birth

Demonstrate application of the police officer shooting kit

Discussion of blood borne pathogens, risk of disease transmission

Group discussion/instruction

- Determining factors for unconscious victim for life and non-life threatening conditions
- Care of victim of sudden illness
- Care for different types of wounds including burns and bleeding
- Recognize the signs of shock
- Care of persons having a seizure
- Care for muscle, bone, and joint injuries to the head, neck, and back
