COURSE TITLE: Emergency Response Team Training (CJA 008C)

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- List the responsibilities of individual emergency response team members during a deployment.
- Plan an ERT deployment in compliance with local policies and laws.
- Demonstrate a safe emergency response using tactics that balance employee safety and the appropriate level of force used to respond to an incident.

GRADING:

All course testing protocols are consistent with California – Standards and Training (for) Corrections (STC) rules and regulations.

STC certified instructors evaluate student performance in all tested exercises. Students are required to pass all tested exercises to pass the course.
