Articulation Agreements with SAC Credit

English Placement into English 101:

The high school Composition 2 course (HSENG 084) will act as a transition course into credit

English 101 with the following stipulations.

- a. Student receives an 80% or higher
- b. Student does not receive the final grade through a challenge of the course

Math Placement into Math 83 or 84:

The Algebra 1B course (HSMTH 164) will act as a transition course into credit Math 83 or 84 with the following stipulations.

- a. Student receives a 70% or higher
- b. Passes a version of the N-48 final exam with a 70% or higher

High School students are still able to challenge the Composition 2 course for course and proficiency credit. However, this does not meet the agreement for transfer to English 101.

These courses are open to all non-credit and credit students trying to place in credit courses without the placement.

Articulation Agreements with SAC Credit

English Placement into English 101:

The high school Composition 2 course (HSENG 084) will act as a transition course into credit English 101 with the following stipulations.

- c. Student receives an 80% or higher
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Math Placement into Math 83 or 84:

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- d. Passes a version of the N-48 final exam with a 70% or higher

High School students are still able to challenge the Composition 2 course for course and proficiency credit. However, this does not meet the agreement for transfer to English 101.

These courses are open to all non-credit and credit students trying to place in credit courses without the placement.


