Project Aims to Increase Certificate and Degree Completion

Santa Ana, Calif. – Santa Ana College (SAC) is one of 20 community colleges selected to participate in the California Guided Pathways Project. This venture, inspired by the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) Pathways Project, is designed to substantially increase the number of students who earn a certificate or degree. SAC was chosen through a competitive application process and has until 2019 to design and implement structured academic and career pathways for all incoming students.

During the 2015-16 academic year, over 4,700 SAC students earned their associate degrees or certificates of achievement. The Guided Pathways framework will provide additional

assistance to students who face barriers in completing their college education. By creating structured educational experiences with specific course sequences and progress milestones, students are supported from their point of entry, to degree or certificate attainment, to employment in a chosen field.
