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Getting to Know Yolanda Garcia, Librarian Extraordinaire

Yolanda was born in Havana, Cuba. Her father, Sergio Lopez-Mesa, was an esteemed sculptor who studied in Italy. Her mother, Yolanda Lopez-Mesa, was a professor of Cuban history. At the age of six, Yolanda and her family left Cuba as political refugees. Her family first traveled to Mexico City, then had a short stay in Miami, Florida, and ultimately ended up making their home in Columbia, South Carolina, for many years. While in South Carolina, Yolanda's parents taught at Allen University. Her mother taught Spanish and her dad taught courses in art and art history.

Yolanda and her family moved to California in 1971 when her father was offered a sculpting position at

Mattel, Inc. She has lived in Redondo Beach, San Pedro, Riverside, and Santa Ana. She currently lives in Rancho Palos Verdes. Yolanda attended El Camino College and transferred to Cal State Long Beach where she received a bachelor's degree in Spanish literature. Her master's degree in library science is from UCLA. Her master's thesis was on library services to Spanish-speaking populations.

Before coming to SAC, Yolanda worked for 8 years as a librarian at the Anaheim Public Library. She was also a student worker at the UCLA Research Library. In her pre-library days, Yolanda was an eligibility worker for the Department of Public Social Services.

Yolanda is passionate about her family and the history of her family. She has two daughters and four grandchildren. Gardening, cooking, and entertaining are some of her other passions. She enjoys Cuban, Mediterranean, Italian, and Spanish food. If Yolanda was offered an all-expenses paid vacation to anywhere in the world, she would travel to Greece.
