



#### About Degrees/Certificates

Library Technology

The Bachelor of Science Degree is a fouryear degree requiring students to complete 120 units of course work consisting of upper and lower division major/discipline and general education courses.

The Associate in Arts Degree for Transfer (AA-T) and Associate in Science Degree for Transfer (AS-T) are degrees that qualify students for transfer to CSU, many Independent California Colleges and Universities as a Junior.

Major classes plus general education classes = 60 units.

All Associate degrees offered at Santa Ana College provide students with the necessary skills to compete successfully in related job markets. Completion of an Associate degree does not always adequately satisfy transfer major requirements. Meet with a counselor to develop a custom education plan.

Certificates of Achievement (CA) and Proficiency (CP) are a verification of achievement in a particular academic or occupational area requiring 6-30 units of major/discipline focused classes.

**Cal-IGETC** "Certification" refers to the official notification provided by Santa Ana College that a student transferring to any UC or CSU campus has completed courses fulfilling lower-division general education requirements. Without certification students will be held to the general education requirements specific to the UC or CSU campus to which they transfer. Students fully certified in Cal-GETC are also qualified to receive a Certificate of Achievement in Cal-GETC.

It is the student's responsibility to request certification by submitting a completed certification/certificate of achievement petition to the Admissions and Records Office prior to established deadlines.



## Santa Ana College Associate Degrees for Transfer A.A.-T and A.S.-T. - known as ADT's Requirements



IMPORTANT NOTE: Requirements for ADT's differ from other SAC Associate Degree (A.A. and A.S.) requirements

These degrees are designed to provide a clear pathway to a CSU major and baccalaureate degree. SAC students who are awarded an ADT are guaranteed admission with junior standing somewhere in the CSU system and are given priority admission consideration to their local CSU campus or to a program that is deemed "similar"** to their community college major. This priority does NOT guarantee admission to specific majors or campuses. Students who have been awarded an ADT are able to complete their remaining requirements for the 120 unit baccalaureate degree within 60 semester units.

\*\*What does it mean for my ADT to be "Similar"?

In order to receive all Associate Degree for Transfer guarantees/benefits, the CSU campus to which you are transferring *must* have identified your particular transfer degree as "similar" to your chose CSU major/concentration.

The website: https://www.calstate.edu/apply/transfer/Pages/associate-degree-for-transfer-major-and-campus-search.aspx shows you all CSU majors/concentrations that have been deemed "similar" to each associate degree for transfer.

For example, on this website (under "Search by major of Interest") if you select Business Administration 2.0 and Fullerton (under "search by CSU") you will see the following Business Administration concentrations listed as "similar": Accounting, Business Analytics, Business Economics, Decision Sciences, Entertainment & Hospitality Management, Entrepreneurship, Finance, General Management, Human Resource Management, Information Systems, Legal Studies, Marketing, Operations and Supply Chain Management, Risk Management and Insurance, Economics – General, Global Trade, and Intercultural Management.

What will *not* be shown are additional Business Administration/concentrations offered by CSUF: joint emphasis in Accounting & Information Systems, joint emphasis in Accounting & Finance, Accounting & Business Analytics, Business & Economics Analytics, Marketing and Information Systems, Professional Business (online only), and Real Estate. This is because these majors/concentrations have not been deemed "similar".

NOTE: Some CSU campuses will still grant students priority in the admission process if they have earned an ADT, even if their ADT is not "similar" to their transfer major. These students however will not be granted all ADT guarantees.

SAC students are strongly encouraged to meet with a counselor to review their options for transfer, and to determine whether or not an ADT is right for them.

### ADT Course Substitutions and Reciprocity, Policy and Procedures For coursework not completed at SAC

Students who have completed courses at another California community college, a regionally accredited institution and/or completed an external exam such as AP, CLEP, or IB may apply the coursework or exam results toward A.A.-T/A.S.-T major requirements as follows:

- A course with a C-ID designation which is completed at another California community college will be substituted for a SAC course that meets an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) major requirement designated with the same C-ID number. SAC departmental approval is not required.
- 2. A course without a C-ID designation which is completed at a regionally accredited institution, other than a California community college, will be reviewed by SAC discipline faculty. Course-to-course substitution will be granted based on discipline faculty determination of comparability to a SAC course with the approved C-ID designation for the given ADT. Course-to-course substitution will be granted in accordance with the state-wide C-ID descriptor when the SAC course does not have an approved C-ID designation, but a statewide C-ID descriptor exists. When no such descriptor exists, course substitution will be based on discipline faculty determination of comparability to a SAC course included on the ADT.
- Students who have completed an external examination such as AP, CLEP, and IB are granted course credit toward ADT
  major requirements as listed in the SAC catalog.(Students should be aware that AP credit may be awarded/counted differently by the transfer institution.)
- 4. A course completed at another California community college that is approved as part of an associate degree for transfer will be applied to the corresponding Santa Ana College Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) in the corresponding SAC ADT area. Courses completed at other California community colleges must be part of the ADT at the time the student completed the course. Courses completed at other CCC's prior to ADT approval will be "grandfathered".

#### CALIFORNIA COLLEGE PROMISE GRANT PROGRAM (CCPG)

The California College Promise Grant Program (CCPG) which pays for enrollment fees, is available to California residents and AB540 students who qualify in one of the following ways:

- 1. You or your parents, if you are dependent, receive CalWORKs/TANF, SSI/SSP or GA/GR (General Assistance General Relief)
- 2. Your total family's income (adjusted gross income and/or untaxed income) from two years ago was less than 150% of the federal poverty guidelines.
- 3. You have applied for financial aid through the FAFSA or the California Dream Act and have been determined to have more than \$1,103 in financial need by the Financial Aid Office.

To apply for the California College Promise Grant Program, please apply online at **studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa** or **dream.csac.ca.gov**. The CCPG must be renewed every year starting each Summer term.

#### **GLOSSARY**

**Articulation:** Articulation is the process that links two educational institutions to help students make a smooth transition from a community college such as Santa Ana College to a four-year college or university without experiencing a delay or duplication of coursework. Course agreements for CSU, UC and CCC are available on **assist.org**. For out-of-state and private institutions, please visit **sac.edu/counseling** 

Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT): The Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) is intended for community college students who plan to transfer and complete a bachelor's degree in a designated similar major at a CSU campus. For more information about the benefits for this program visit





**Cal-GETC (Plan 2):** California General Education Transfer Curriculum is the singular general education pathway for California Community College (CCC) students to fulfill lower-division general education requirements necessary for transfer and admission to both the California State University (CSU) and the University of California (UC). A petition must be completed with a counselor and submitted to the Graduation Office, S-104, to be certified.

**Electives:** Courses that are not required or used for a specific major, general education, or graduation requirements, but can be used to complete the total units required for a degree and/or transfer.

**General Education (Plan 1):** A program of courses in the arts and sciences that provides students with a broad educational experience. Courses typically include the fields of Mathematics, English, Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Physical and Life Sciences. Completion of a general education program is required for the associate degree. Plan 1 is not advisable for students planning to transfer to a 4-year institution.

**Impaction:** When a particular major or campus has received more applicants than spaces available, that major/campus is declared impacted. Applicants applying to these majors/campuses will go through a more competitive selection process. For more information on impaction, please directly contact the university.

**Lower Division:** Courses offered at the freshman or sophomore levels of college. Community colleges typically offer only lower division courses.

Major: A series of courses in a particular field of study designed to develop special knowledge, skills or expertise.

**Major Preparation:** A set of lower division courses required for a major that sets the foundation for upper division coursework. Transfer students are required to complete certain major preparation courses to meet admissions requirements for the 4-year institution. For more information on major preparation, consult with a counselor. For CSU and UC requirements visit **assist.org** 

Minor: A secondary field of study in addition to the major—typically requires fewer courses than a major.

**Pre-requisite:** A course or courses that must be successfully completed before a student can enroll in the next-level course.

**Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG):** Interested students must meet campus-specific requirements to qualify for a UC TAG. By participating, students can ensure their admissions to a participating UC campus. Currently, six campuses participate in TAG- Davis, Irvine, Merced, Riverside, Santa Barbara, and Santa Cruz. For more information, visit the University Transfer Center, S-110.

**Transferable Courses:** Santa Ana College courses designed for transfer are numbered 100 level and above. Each university determines how/if these courses meet transfer requirements.

**Upper Division:** Courses offered primarily for junior or senior level college students. Most community colleges do not offer upper division courses.


