- I. Approval of Minutes of September 21, 2011**—The minutes of September 21, 2011 were approved as written by members present. Please review them and let Bonnie know by October 28th if you recommend changes.

- II. College-Wide Strategic Plan 2007-2015 Mid-Plan Planning Retreat F11 (See Appendix A)**
 - A. Update from the Workgroup**— Bonnie gave the workgroup report and suggestions were made. President Martinez will be invited to the next meeting of IE&A to give her recommendations so we may proceed with planning the March 2nd event. Sara will procure U-201A.
- III. RSCCD Strategic Plan** –Bonnie is working on a document to align the District Strategic Plan with the SAC Vision Themes (See Appendix B).
- IV. Accreditation Update**
 - A. Midterm Report**—The *SAC Midterm Report* was approved by the board of Trustees on October 10, 2011 and sent to the Commission, which has acknowledged receipt.
 - B. Preparation for Self Study 2014**—Planning for the October 2014 Institutional Self Evaluation will occur spring 2012. Linda and Bonnie will work on preparing documents for review.

V. Reports:

- A. Planning and Budget: SAC, BAPR, BAPR WG**—BAPR has voted to expand BAPR Workgroup to include a planning component. Each college will appoint designees to provide this function. President Martinez has appointed Ray Hicks, president of the Academic Senate, Linda Rose, Vice President of Academic Affairs, and Bonnie Jaros, IE&A Coordinator.
- B. Facilities Committee**—It was reported that state approval will be sought for renovation of Dunlap Hall, which could proceed summer 2012.
- C. SACTAC**—Ray Hicks will join SACTAC to maintain linkage to district TAG as well as reporting to IE&A.
- D. Program Review & Institutional Effectiveness**—In an effort to align planning and budget explicitly, Linda and Bonnie are working on a more robust linkage of the annual Department Planning Portfolio (DPP) with the quadrennial PA/PR capstone process. The deans are currently working with chairs in their respective divisions on division goals and plans. Linda is also working on an Academic Affairs Area Plan which would include the department level, the division level and other areas of responsibility contained with Academic Affairs.

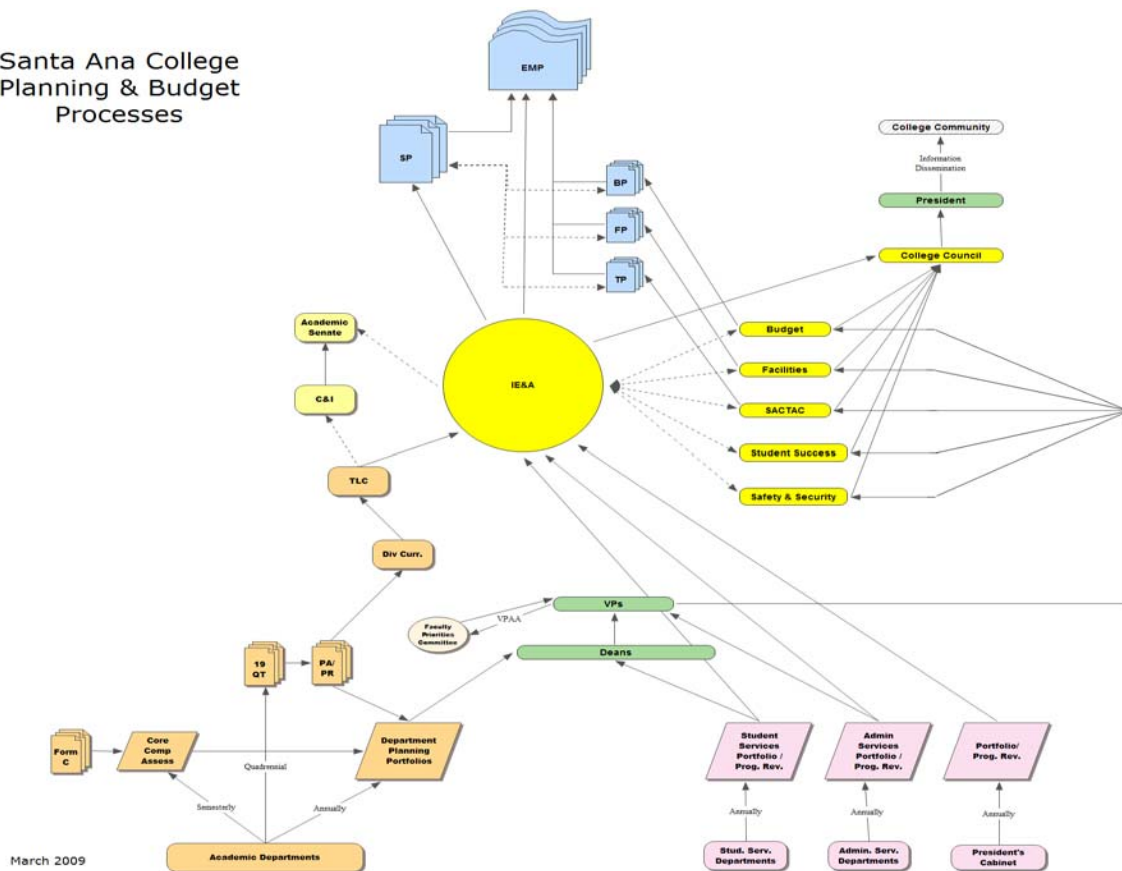
